Opening Comments

- Turn to **2 John**
- Today, we are going to look at this little letter written by the Apostle John
- At the time of this writing he was the last living of the original Twelve disciples of Christ about 85 years old
- This letter as well as 3 John were written about the same time
- A standard papyrus was about 10 x 8 inches
- Each of these letters would have filled one page almost exactly
- Like sending a text, John said as much as he could in one text block
- As we look at these two letters today and next Sunday, you will notice a lot of similarity with each other, and to 1 John
- In fact, John introduces nothing new as far as doctrine is concerned
- Instead the focus is on application
- If you recall our study through 1 John, remember John was dealing with false teachers, who said Jesus did not actually come in the flesh
- Here in 2 John these same teachers come into view and John instructs his readers to avoid them
- Then in 3 John he gives instruction about receiving true teachers
- Let's pray now and then get into our text
- <u>Pray</u>

Teaching

- John opens this letter with a greeting
- <u>2 John 1-3</u>
- In both 2 and 3 John, John identifies himself not by name, but as 'The Elder'
- While this is one of the titles of leaders in the church, probably not what he means
- Could also apply to his great age John the Elder the old dude

Lavish Love 2 John– Living in Truth!

- Might also apply to his distinction as the last of the twelve direct disciples of Christ
- He is writing to 'the elect lady' he doesn't name her
- In 3 John letter is addressed to Gaius
- The elect lady could be a woman whom he chooses not to name, but many commentators also believe that he is addressing a church
- Peter uses a similar term in chapter five of his first letter
- After studying, it doesn't really appear to matter which is right, the truth applies to both equally
- I tend to lean toward the view that he is addressing a church in Asia Minor, but won't be dogmatic about it
- John then expresses his affection for this church
- four times in the first three verses John refers to truth
- Truth and love are inseparable
- For love to exist, truth must be present
- Where truth is lacking, so also is love
- Anyone who has been lied to or betrayed can attest to the reality of that
- It is difficult to believe that someone loves you if they are lying to you
- In the rest of the letter John is going to make three general appeals to encourage them to live in the truth
- First Appeal Continue to love fellow Christians
- <u>2 John 4</u>
- This verse is one of the reasons I tend toward the thought that this letter was written to a church rather than to a person
- The phrase 'some of your children' implies that John encountered some of these people outside of the church, while he was separated from them
- What John witnessed was that they were 'walking in truth'
- John is saying that he was blessed to see these 'children' obeying God's commandments as he had taught them
- As a father I can relate to that love to see my kids 'walking in truth'
- Same is true as a pastor awesome to see people growing in their faith and 'getting it'

- He then reminds them of something he taught extensively in his first letter
- <u>2 John 5-6</u>
- You cannot say honestly that you love God and then live in disobedience to Him
- Loving other Christians is one of the ways we prove that we are Living in the Truth **1 John 4:20-21**

If someone says, "I love God," and hates his brother, he is a liar; for he who does not love his brother whom he has seen, how can he love God whom he has not seen? And this commandment we have from Him: that he who loves God *must* love his brother also.

- John's second appeal to these people he loves Guard against false teachers
- This was a primary focus of 1 John
- So he reminds them what to look for
- <u>2 John 7</u>
- We have to keep in mind as we read things like this that the church was not what it is today
- They did not have the New Testament yet
- They had some letters like this one
- I have a library of a couple hundred books
- My Bible software contains thousands of resources
- Thankfully I can spend dozens of hours every week studying God's Word
- Most churches in that day were being led by men that had little or no training in the Word
- And so it was not uncommon that they would have itinerant preachers come in and teach the congregation
- That opened the door to unscrupulous men seeing an opportunity to take advantage of the generosity of Christians
- Some were doing it for financial gain, others to satisfy some unholy need to fame or glory
- A common trait of the false teachers at this time was a denial of the incarnation of Jesus

• As Christians we believe that Jesus, God the Son existed from eternity past with God John 1:1-2

In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was in the beginning with God.

• When the time was right in God's plan of redemption, He sent Jesus to be born of the virgin Mary **John 1:14**

And the Word became flesh and dwelt among us, and we beheld His glory, the glory as of the only begotten of the Father, full of grace and truth.

- This is one of the key doctrines of the faith
- Jesus became what we are so that He could make us like He is
- Without that, there is no true hope of salvation
- That is why John and the other Bible writers speak so aggressively against this false teaching
- Jude, who we will get to in a couple of weeks wrote this about these false teachers **Jude 12-13**

These are spots in your love feasts, while they feast with you without fear, serving *only* themselves. *They are* clouds without water, carried about by the winds; late autumn trees without fruit, twice dead, pulled up by the roots; raging waves of the sea, foaming up their own shame; wandering stars for whom is reserved the blackness of darkness forever.

- John warns his friends to watch out for these guys
- <u>2 John 8</u>
- John doesn't want to lose what they have been working for
- And that is good spiritual fruit in the lives of those they have ministered to
- Notice he mentions that they are looking forward to a 'full reward'
- John is not referring to temporal benefits not about financial gain
- The Bible teaches that faithful service to God will earn us some kind of rewards in heaven 1 Corinthians 3:14-15

If anyone's work which he has built on *it* endures, he will receive a reward. If anyone's work is burned, he will suffer loss; but he himself will be saved, yet so as through fire.

- The reward is not heaven that is promised to all true believers of Christ
- The Bible doesn't tell us what the rewards are, but if they are given to us in the perfection of heaven, they will be perfect
- We have to guard ourselves against false doctrines and teaching
- <u>2 John 9</u>

- The word 'transgresses' there has the idea of 'to go on ahead'
- These are the progressives
- Watch out for anyone telling you that we need to change the gospel to be relevant to our culture
- The gospel message was perfect, exactly the way Jesus spoke it
- I'll be relevant in my relationships but not in the message
- John's third appeal Reject the False Teachers

• <u>2 John 10-11</u>

- Hospitality was an important aspect of the culture in that part of the world
- Taking in and caring for strangers and travelers was what people did in polite society
- As the Apostles and Prophets traveled about sharing the gospel message, there weren't any Holiday Inns or Embassy Suites to stay at
- They depended upon the hospitality of those they were ministering to
- We see an example of that in Acts 16 when Lydia asks Paul and his companions to come and stay at her house
- John here, tells them to do the opposite of hospitality, to reject the false teachers, don't even say hello to them That sounds rude
- His point is if you do, you are sharing in his evil deeds
- This would have been counter-cultural
- A modern example of false teaching is the Mormons and Jehovah Witnesses
- As Christians, we should have nothing to do with either group
- They both teach that Jesus was not God in the flesh, just like the false teachers that John is talking about
- The next time people from either of these groups knocks on your door
- Don't hide from don't invite them in and talk to them
- Instead tell them I can't talk to you you are false teachers who teach that Jesus, God the Son did not come in the flesh
- And if you don't repent of that sin and escape the false religion you are a part of you will die in your sins and go to hell where your punishment will be severe because you have led others astray from the truth

- If you invite them in and talk to them, even if you are trying to share truth with them they will go to your neighbors and tell them about the wonderful conversation they had with you you are sharing in their evil
- Don't yell at them, or sic your dog on them, or turn your sprinklers on them but don't do anything that will enable them to continue their evil work
- John wraps up this letter quickly

• <u>2 John 12-13</u>

- John was going to making a visit to them, but the matter was so urgent that he sent this letter ahead
- John is looking forward to seeing them
- Doesn't want to come there and find false teachers being invited into people's homes and into the church
- The key for us today is a phrase in verse 8 'look to yourselves'
- God doesn't want us to blissfully ignorant of the dangers around us **Ephesians 4:14**

...we should no longer be children, tossed to and fro and carried about with every wind of doctrine, by the trickery of men, in the cunning craftiness of deceitful plotting...

- To live in the truth we need to avoid the lie, that which is false
- Paul said 'Examine yourself' do you know the truth, do you know God's Word well enough to know when someone is telling you something false
- And if you are tempted to say 'yes, how do you know that for sure?
- Our best defense is to saturate our heart, mind, and soul with the Word of God
- And then to humble ourselves before God and ask the Holy Spirit to lead us along the narrow path of truth
- 'look to yourselves' means you have to do your part
- But once you have done your part, God does the hard parts
- God starts the work, does the work, and finishes the work in your life
- But He won't do it apart from your cooperation with Him
- And as John started this letter, do it by loving God by loving one another Amen
